The Newsletter of the Department of History and Philosophy of Science (PHS) aims to inform about activities of its members of staff and students. The History and Philosophy of Science is an interdisciplinary academic field, which studies science as a complex historical, social, and cultural phenomenon and highlights the philosophical dimensions of its theories and practice. It examines the philosophical, conceptual, and historical approaches to science in general, as well as to a variety of particular research fields, including the humanities and social sciences, natural sciences, psychology and cognitive sciences, life and medical sciences, mathematics and logic, and new technologies. The <u>faculty members</u> of the Department include some of the world experts in their respective fields, while several of the members lead or collaborate in international research projects. The Department consists of three Divisions: History of Science and Technology, Philosophy and Theory of Science, and Technology, and Cognitive Science. It offers the sole <u>undergraduate</u> programme of studies on History and Philosophy of Science in Greece and 9 postgraduate programmes of studies in both Greek and English, which cover a wide range of philosophical topics, the history of science and technology, studies in society, science and technology, digital humanities and augmented textual studies, and cognitive psychology. PHS is among the highest rated of humanities departments in Greece, in terms of international research citations.

Research News

- Aristotle Professor **Tympas** participates in the research team of the proposal "A transfer of knowledge and technology for investigating genderbased inappropriate social interactions in the Metaverse (META-TOO)", which was selected for funding by the EU (HORIZON-HORIZON program WIDERA-2023-ACCESS-02-01). The scientific coordinator of META-TOO is Maria Roussou, associate professor at the
- NKUA Department of Informatics and Telecommunications. The funding of META-TOO is in the order of 1.5 million euros. NKUA, the coordinating institution, is joined in this project by two European institutions that lead in research in computing technology, INRIA and IDIBAPS.
- Vladimiros Katranidis, PhD Candidate at the Department of History and Philosophy of Science has recently

received a scholarship from the Hellenic Foundation for Research & Innovation. His PhD topic is "A critical investigation

of the necessitism-contingentism debate in modal metaphysics". He is supervised by Assoc. Professor Yannis Stephanou.

Big Data and Data mining processes comprise relatively new fields museum research and inquiry, which are expected to become core disciplines as museum data input increases and digital museum data collections from museums' activities and operations everyday become increasingly larger. 

Seifert, Vanessa, <u>Chemistry's Metaphysics</u>, Cambridge: Cambridge University

Press, 2024.



Abstract: The place of chemistry in the metaphysics of science may be viewed as peripheral compared to physics and biology. However, a metaphysics of science that disregards chemistry would be incomplete and ill-informed. This Element establishes this claim showing how key metaphysical issues are informed by drawing on chemistry. Five metaphysical topics investigated: natural kinds, scientific realism, reduction, laws and causation. These topics are spelled out from the perspective of ten chemical case studies, each of which illuminates the novel ways that metaphysics of science can be informed by chemistry.

Abstract: A Greek translation of the book Technology: Critical history of a concept (The University of Chicago Press, 2018) by Eric Schatzberg, Professor at the School of History and Sociology, Georgia Institute of Technology, is available in Greek through the University Press of Crete (2024,translated by Thomas Tsakalakis). In his introduction, Aristotle Tympas, Professor of the History of Technology and Director of the NKUA anglophone interdepartmental graduate program in STS, notes: "Schatzberg's book forces us to study the reason for the absence of our concept 'technology' from the Classic and Hellenistic Antiquity, as well as from the Byzantine and the Ottoman Empire. Studying this absence is, I would argue, an absolute priority for the

decisive enrichment of the way we the difference between understand modernity, historical capitalism, and the previous historical periods. Unlike the products of the problematic assumption that the concept 'technology' can be used without qualifications in reference to the Ancient Greek and Byzantine history, studies to take into account seriously the absence (or the different meaning) of this concept before industrial capitalism will be of special interest to the international community of professional historians of technology".

New MSc Programme

• The new postgraduate program MA in Greek and Chinese Civilizations. A Comparative Approach, is the result of collaboration between four major Greek universities, which joined forces to create an exceptionally competitive Program: National and Kapodistrian University of Athens (Department of History and Philosophy of Science) // Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (Department of Philosophy and Education)

// University of Patras (Department of Philosophy) // University of Crete (Department of Philosophical and **Social Studies)**. This two-year program presents a dual global uniqueness: (a) it is the only one that combines one year of studies in China (at Southwest University, Chongqing) and one year of studies in Greece (at the University of which also administrative responsibility of the pro-

gram), (b) it is the only Master's Program, both in Greece and worldwide, focusing exclusively on the comparative study of these two civilizations. The first year of studies is devoted to Chinese civilization (with an emphasis and the second to Greek history) civilization (with an emphasis philosophy). The comparative character of the program is ensured, among other

things, by the fact that students' dissertations must necessarily concern both civilizations. The program began operating in September 2023, in China, with 18 participants. All students from Greece receive scholarships either from the Chinese State or from the province of Chongqing. The Director of the Program is Professor **Pavlos Kontos** (University of Patras).
